Orchard Park has once again achieved very strong GCSE results. Within a reported national picture of lower grades, a return to 2019 grade boundaries and a cohort who have experienced Covid-related disruptions to their education, we are extremely proud of our students. Our community obtained results that are significantly higher than our pre-pandemic outcomes and our highest ever attainment and progress.

Ms Moran, Headteacher, said: "I am so pleased with these well-deserved GCSE results. They are only possible with hard work from students and staff, along with the support of our families: well done to you all! We should not underestimate the challenges this cohort has faced over the last three years: their determination and expert guidance from their teachers has secured this success. Getting creative!

The creative and performing arts department has had a wonderful start to this academic year. Our artists, actors/actresses, musicians and dancers have all shown such drive and enthusiasm for their learning.

Musicians have made a great start in Year 7. Learning rhythm through playing the three tones produced on the Djembe. Our musicians in Year 8 have enjoyed playing the keyboard, exploring the Blues. In Year 9, musicians have explored music at the movies, enjoying the suspense motifs behind the *James Bond* films.

Artists in Year 7 have been introduced to observational drawing with a focus on the formal elements of line, shape, tone, form and texture. They have recorded confidently from observation a range of seasonal natural forms such as pumpkins and gourds. Year 8 artists have been refining the accuracy of their drawing recording individual facial features and portraits in proportion. Year 9 artists have focused on mark making, recording both manmade and natural textured surfaces.

Year 7 actors and actresses have had an exciting introduction to LAMDA, learning difficult tongue twisters and practising their diction and articulation. Year 8 have focused on mime thinking hard about their physicality. Year 9 have been introduced to drama practitioners and naturalism.

It has been a very successful half term in dance and all of our students have continued to impress us with their continued commitment and enthusiasm for their learning. Our Key





Stage 3 students have been busy creating dance motifs using greetings gestures as a stimulus in Year 7, studying the history of Black American dance crazes in Year 8 and creating their own choreographies in response to the professional work *Shadows* in Year 9. We welcome back Cynthia and Vivian from the Royal Academy of Dance, who are teaching our extra-curricular provision, as well as the fabulous Sim from Birdgang dance company who has already started creating a piece for the show with his very committed performers.



Tales of the river bank

This term, Year 11 geographers visited the River Tillingbourne in Surrey to conduct their GCSE physical geography fieldwork. Students were investigating the enquiry question: 'How does the discharge of the River Tillingbourne change as you move downstream?'. In the wonderful sunshine, students carried out several primary data collection methods at three different sites, including width, depth and velocity.

Year 11 geographer, Plamena, said: "My hypothesis was that the River Tillingbourne's discharge will increase downstream. This is because in class we learnt that more tributaries join the river in the middle course. In addition, we would expect the width and depth to

increase, therefore the river can hold more water. From my data analysis, I was able to conclude that my hypothesis was correct. Overall, I enjoyed the field trip to the River Tillingbourne because I now understand rivers a lot more due to seeing river processes in real life."

The geography department would like to commend the Year 11 students for their hard work during the field trip and extend our gratitude to Mr Fallon, Mr Wright and Ms Byrne for their brilliant support throughout the day. We look forward to completing the human geography fieldwork enquiry with Year 11 next half term.
